Feast of the Baptism of the Lord



A person would almost have to be stone deaf and totally blind to miss the connections between the Mass and social justice. It is good for us this Sunday to pray for ears to hear, eyes to see and a heart to feel what we are really about when we celebrate Mass.

What the incarnation is really about is the Word of God emptying himself and becoming one of us. The life of Jesus shows him reaching out to those in need; the hungry, blind, deaf, lame, possessed, outcast and sinner. He laid down his life to save the world. He calls us at the Eucharist and through the Eucharist to do this in memory of him.

At Mass, try to sing the songs about the goodness of the world and the beauties of creation and the abundant blessings of God through the heart of an African mother still holding in hear arms the infant who just starved to death, or with the heart of the father who just discovered the mutilated body of his son, or from the heart of an innocent prisoner awaiting execution on death row.

Do we rush through a penitential rite, perhaps briefly giving thought to our impatient words at home or at work? But do we think of the hundreds without work while the government leaders we voted into office are enacting policies that are neither helpful nor constructive. Talk about needing the Lord's mercy! That mercy must be infinite, because our personal and social sins are enormous.

We must be certain of that mercy to be able to follow that penitential rite by singing "Glory to God and peace to God's people on earth." How do we worship God, give him thanks and praise in a world of such sin? We need to ask him again and again to take away that sin and have mercy on us.

Please note that everyone



FAQ's Regarding Baptism

Can our child be baptized if we're not practicing Catholics?

Baptism is more than a rite of passage for a child or a washing away of original sin. Baptism is a sharing in the life of the risen Christ. Baptism is also the first step of initiation into the Christian community. During the Rite of Baptism, parents promise to raise their child in the practice of the faith. Parents who are not practicing members of the community may be asked to delay the Baptism of their child until they have reestablished that connection by participation in Sunday Eucharist.

Can our child be baptized if we're not married?

Not married in the Church? Your child's Baptism and your marriage are two separate issues. Your marital status may be discussed during your Baptism interview to encourage you to get married (or validate your marriage in the Church) if this is appropriate. However, as long as you are committed to raising your child as a Catholic, he/she may celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism and be welcomed into the Catholic Church.
