Donation Tax Receipts are ready for pickup at the Desk Jesus opened his arms in welcome and proclaimed: "I have come, not to abolish the law and the prophets. I have come to fulfill them!" The crowds gathered on the hillside had never heard anyone like Jesus befroe. His confident teaching sounded like new scripture. Jesus was quoting from Deuteronomy, but his own bold words seemed more sacred as he warned of the danger of overlooking the spirit and quality of the law in favor of strict regulations.

One of the older men in the crowd protested: "You're on dangerous ground if you're telling us that the law is to be changed." Jesus looked at him gently, and with a smile of reassurance said, "Until heaven and earth pass away, nto the smallest letter of the law, not the smallest part of a letter, shall be done away with until it all comes true."

Like an eager student, Peter's eyes were fixed on Jesus as he held command of the moment. Iesus preaching was like the masterful toss of a fishing net. The words flew out over the crowd and then settled down over them. As the people began to understand, Jesus drew them closer, assuring the gathering that he wasnt trying to replace the Jewish laws. He was bringing these laws no refinement and perfection. He told them the laws weren't about just getting by and doing the minimum. He invited them to embrace the law completely, to let it seep beneath their skin and into their lives. "I tell you," Jesus declared, "that unless your holiness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees you shall not enter the kingdom of God."

Peter gave John a hopeless look as he realized Jesus' lofty requirements of discipleship. He was just a fisherman. How could he be holier than the

highly respected Pharisees or the scribes of the Law?

Jesus went on to preach that the sin of anger can lead to the sin of murder; that lustful thoughts become adultery; and that oaths and agreements are made to be broken unless they flow from an honest and truthful heart.

Jesus told them: "Say yes when you mean yes and no when you mean no. Anything beyond that is from the evil one."

Today we are still called to fulfill the laws which Jesus preached about on the hillside near Capernaum. We are challenged to obey the spirit of the law as well as the specific words. Jesus says that "getting by" is not enough. As we approach the Lenten Season Jesus' teachings gently lead us to a more profound preparation.

I don't want to be a burden...

This line of thinking suggests that those who suffer are not worth the time and care they require. We need to approach people with compassion, not with a utilitarian calculus. We have a responsibility to love and support each other so that no one will ever feel compelled to request euthanasia or assisted suicide because they feel they are a burden.

The fear of being a burden is the key reason why some people ask to have their death hastened. Many Canadians also feel abandoned and are very isolated. They need to be consoled, encouraged and comforted.

- Elder abuse is already a problem . in Canada because many senior citizens do not have the capacity to fight for the care and respect they deserve. If euthanasia becomes an option for the vulnerable and their caregivers, it could very easily be used as a threat or translated into a duty to die.
- Some Dutch elders. who experience this kind of pressure, are migrating to nearby Germany because they no longer trust their doctors and fear their loved ones will take advantage of their vulnerability to shorten their lives.
- We need to focus on providing compassionate care for the elderly and for those with Alzheimer's disease, dementia, severe disabilities and debilitating diseases, as well as greater support for their families through home care and other services.
