LENT is above all the "desert season," and the gospel invites us to spend some time there with Jesus. Like him, we need to stand in the scorched sand under the noon sun to see things, as they really are - not packaged and controlled, but rough and raw and cantankerous.

The authentic, wholly human person is one who has squarely faced the best and the worst in themselves because they have battled their own desert demon. And no other demon will do. There are countless disciplines and endless sufferings we bring on ourselves. There is a whole lifetime of mistakes that should forge us into shape, but somehow they never got quite to the heart of the matter. The number of our private demons is legion, but we fight them in vain on our own terms. The only demon that really matters waits for us in the desert forward and thrive. - on its own ground.

That is why Jesus went to the desert. facing homelessness, Not that his enemy wasn't everywhere, but for the showdown you have to stalk the beasts in their lair, and you have to accept the naked truth. When world, Jesus did not argue - he gave the devil his due. And it is significant that Jesus did not overwhelm the devil in majestic splendor - he simply held his ground until the devil went away. Neither do we have to beat the devil. • We just have to survive the desert. The • victory belongs to someone else.

But if you survive, you come out a different person. The desert is not something you do - it's something you endure. It isn't something you make of yourself; it is something else that makes you. That is why it is so hard to choose the desert. We never know what's waiting there; or what will • happen to us, or how we will come out.

Someone says: There are reports of Assisted Suicide happening, shouldn't it be better that the government regulate it?

- As Canadians, we have rejected the death penalty knowing that, among other things, occasional judicial errors can lead to the execution of innocent people. It would be a contradiction and an injustice to allow some people to directly and intentionally kill others, especially at a time when they are most vulnerable. This is a question of public safety and social justice.
- If euthanasia is being carried out against the law, this shows that the law is incapable of controlling euthanasia. Legalizing euthanasia will not fix this problem. Providing government sanctions for euthanasia will endorse a practice that will harm the most vulnerable members of society and devastate the institution of medicine.

A change in law would jeopardize the role of the medical profession and fundamentally alter the doctorpatient relationship because the so called "right to die" would give doctors the right to directly and intentionally kill. It would undermine the trust between patients and doctors, leading the sick, persons with disabilities and the elderly to fear going to hospitals and other care-giving institutions.

- It is important that euthanasia remain illegal in Canada even if the Hippocratic Oath is no longer the cornerstone of medicine. The law must continue to reinforce the doctor-patient relationship and the role of the physician as a truly compassionate person who sometimes heals, often relieves and alwayscomforts.
- If something is wrong, legalizing it will not make it right. Public acceptance of euthanasia and assisted suicide would dull our consciences to the gravity of taking human life. It would diminish our compassion.
